Local court reporter to serve on national board RandiAnn Harvey, from Cambridge, Minn., to serve three-year term

RESTON, Va., Aug. 6, 2024 — The National Court Reporters Association (NCRA), the country's leading organization representing stenographic court reporters, captioners, and legal videographers, has announced that RandiAnn Harvey, RDR, CRR, CRC, an official court reporter from Cambridge, Minn., has been appointed to serve a three-year term as Director. The announcement was made at the 2024 NCRA Conference & Expo that took place Aug. 1-3, in Louisville, Ky.

Harvey holds the nationally recognized professional certifications of Registered Diplomate Reporter (RDR), Certified Realtime Reporter (CRR), and Certified Realtime Captioner (CRC). She began her court reporting career in 1991, working as a freelance court reporter until 1999 when she became an official court reporter for the Minnesota Fourth Judicial District. In 2002 Harvey became an official court reporter for the Minnesota Tenth Judicial District where she continues to serve. In 2014 and 2020 the court recognized her with its Judicial District Spot Award, and in 2020 she was honored with its Judicial District Achievement Award.

Harvey is a past president of the Minnesota Association of Verbatim Reporters & Captioners and was awarded the Association's Award of Excellence in 2017.

Harvey is a graduate of the Minnesota School of Business.
